We installed new lights in the Lodge room, replacing the 40-year-old fixtures that have been in place since we moved into the building. A special thanks goes out to Brother Harold Dean Hartman for his assistance in acquiring the lighting fixtures and to Brother Royce Peterson for his efforts in the installation.

Greeneville Lodge No. 3 hosted the District 12 Chapter and Council Group Picnic on July 12. More than 100 guests attended, and it was a hit. We had Masons from all across Tennessee visiting our Lodge. Among them were no fewer than 14 current or past Grand heads of various Masonic bodies. Many of them commented on how nice our Lodge is. I take pride in our building, and to receive such complements from visiting dignitaries should be a feather in the cap of all our members.
