
River History

he Nolichucky River is a 115-mile river that flows through East Tennessee and Western North Carolina. The origin of the name is unclear, but it is believed to have derived from the Cherokee name Na'na-tlu gun'yi, or "Spruce Tree Place" which was a Cherokee village settlement located in Jonesborough, Tennessee. Local lore claims that the name means "Rushing Waters."

European frontiersmen began establishing settlements along the river in Greene County during the 1770s. Hostilities began to increase between the frontiersmen and a group of Cherokees called the "Chickamaugas" in the mid-1770s. Chickamauga leader Dragging Canoe led an invasion in July 1776. A young militia officer named John Sevier fled to the Watauga settlements where he earned the nickname "Nolichucky Jack" for his achievements along the river.

In 1912-1913, the Tennessee Eastern Electric Company built the Nolichucky dam. In 1941 East Tennessee Light and Power took ownership of the dam and in 1945 the Tennessee Valley Authority purchased the dam for \$1.47 million and could produce 10,640 kilowatts of electricity. The TVA used the dam until 1972 when sediment buildup made it impractical to generate electricity.


