## **Rudyard Kipling**

any famous authors over the years have been Freemasons. One noteworthy literary master was Rudyard Kipling.

Kipling is famous for his works such as *The Jungle Book, Kim,* and *Gunga Din.* His Masonic affiliation is evident in works such as *The Man Who Would Be King* and *The Mother Lodge.* 

Born in 1865 in Bombay, India, Kipling was the son of a British government official. His father was a Freemason. Well-educated and a writer by nature, Kipling was working as the assistant editor of a newspaper in Lahore, Punjab, when he became a Mason under dispensation at the under-age of 20 because The Lodge of Hope and Perseverance "needed a good secretary." Kipling also became a Mark Master Mason while in India.

Kipling traveled the world throughout his life and joined many Masonic lodges and societies throughout India, England, Scotland, and even the United States. He spent time living in Vermont and wrote some of his more famous works while living there. Kipling was friends with fellow Mason and author Mark Twain.

Kipling's love of Freemasonry is evident in his work. Some of his works contain veiled allusions that only members of the fraternity would catch – such as the old brown bear Baloo teaching young Mowgli the "master word" so he can travel safely throughout the jungle in *The Jungle Book*; others are overtly Masonic.

One of Kipling's masterpieces is *The Man Who Would Be King* (available in our lodge library). This is a lighthearted tale about two con men who happen to be Masons. They use their knowledge of Freemasonry to set up their own kingdom – with unintended consequences – in the outskirts of the British Empire.

Two of Kipling's overtly Masonic poems – *The Mother Lodge* and *Banquet Night* – were written as tributes to the Craft.

One of Kipling's most famous poems is undoubtedly *If*. While it may or may not have been Masonic in inspiration, the words of the poem still right true more than 100 years after it was written.

"If you can keep your head when all about you Are losing theirs and blaming it on you, If you can trust yourself when all men doubt you,

But make allowance for their doubting too; If you can wait and not be tired by waiting, Or being lied about, don't deal in lies, Or being hated, don't give way to hating, And yet don't look too good, nor talk too wise:

If you can dream—and not make dreams your master;

If you can think—and not make thoughts your aim;

If you can meet with Triumph and Disaster And treat those two impostors just the same; If you can bear to hear the truth you've spoken Twisted by knaves to make a trap for fools, Or watch the things you gave your life to, broken,

And stoop and build 'em up with worn-out tools:

If you can make one heap of all your winnings And risk it on one turn of pitch-and-toss, And lose, and start again at your beginnings And never breathe a word about your loss; If you can force your heart and nerve and sinew

To serve your turn long after they are gone, And so hold on when there is nothing in you Except the Will which says to them: "Hold on!"

If you can talk with crowds and keep your virtue,

Or walk with Kings—nor lose the common touch,

If neither foes nor loving friends can hurt you, If all men count with you, but none too much; If you can fill the unforgiving minute With sixty seconds' worth of distance run, Yours is the Earth and everything that's in it,

And—which is more—you'll be a Man, my son."
