The Mighty Acacia

he acacia tree is a cherished symbol in Freemasonry and acts as a gentle melancholy memento of mortality. Through Masonic teachings, the mighty acacia serves as an emblem of life and encourages us to live a life well lived. Though the acacia teaches lessons of morality in the Lodge, it extends those lessons beyond into the world, and acts as a living lesson.

There are few things stronger than the bond between Brother Masons. The mighty acacia also makes a fraternal bond with an unlikely companion. I present *Pseudomyrmex* ferruginea, also known as the acacia ant.

The acacia tree and the acacia ant form a bond referred to in Ecology as a mutualistic symbiotic relationship. Symbiotic means that both organisms can live amongst one another in peace. The mutualistic term means that both organisms benefit from the relationship.

In this particular relationship, the acacia tree serves as the provider. The tree contains nectary glands on the stems which secrete sugary nectar. The tree also provides Beltian bodies. These bodies are generally yellow-



orange in color and are produced on the leaf tips. This provides the ants with a high protein-lipid rich food supply for the ant larvae.

The acacia tree does not only provide a sustainable food source, the first rule of survival is to find shelter. As a defense mechanism against large mammalian predators, acacia trees have developed very large and very sharp thorns. The ants cut holes into the thorns which provides them with shelter

So what do the ants provide the tree? The answer lies in what ants do best, bite and sting! The ants serve as quardians of the

tree. If the tree represented a Lodge, then the ants would definitely be the Tiler! "You shall not pass!" The ants defend and protect the tree with sleepless vigilance against the constant bombardment of predators and competition of daily life.

The mighty acacia is a shining example of teamwork and unity. We each face difficult times. That is just part of living. However, we never have to face them alone. We all know that the acacia is a deep-rooted shrub, and we should strive to allow the lessons it teaches to dig deep into our hearts and minds.
