# I WILL FLY TO THE RELIEF

Every Master Mason has sworn to defend the reputation of a Brother, and now is the time each of us must uphold that obligation. One of our most famous Tennessee Masons is under attack. There is a movement gaining traction across the country to remove Andrew Jackson from the \$20 bill. Who these people want on the bill isn't important; what is important is that these ruffians want to condemn one of our most beloved Tennesseans to the rubbish heap.

Every Mason you know, every person you know, should contact our representatives in Washington and voice their opinion in an effort to halt this movement in its tracks (easy links provided below).

Andrew Jackson was a two-time Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee, serving in 1822 and 1823. Our local history tells us Jackson was no stranger to Greeneville Lodge No. 3, visiting whenever he passed through this way and even filling in various officer stations from time to time. He was a personal friend to many of our earliest elected officers.

He was the first man from west of the Appalachian Mountains to be elected President of the United States, and he is still the only President to pay off the national debt. Prior to becoming our seventh President, Jackson was elected as a U.S. Representative from Tennessee, was elected as a U.S. Senator from the Volunteer State, was a judge on the Tennessee Supreme Court, led U.S. forces to a famous victory at the Battle of New Orleans in the War of 1812, and was elected as a U.S. Senator from Tennessee for a second time. While President, Jackson staved off the dissolution of the Union and the Civil War by decades.

In the 1820s and 1830s when anti-Masonic fervor swept our country and many politicians renounced their membership in our great fraternity, Jackson loudly professed his love of Freemasonry and its principles. In fact, Jackson's election to his second term in office as President in 1832 was notable because he defeated William Wirt, who represented the "Anti-Masonic" Party.

We, not only as Masons and Tennesseans but also as Tennessee Masons, must raise our collective voices in defense of Andrew Jackson. It isn't exactly clear whether anyone in Washington is seriously considering taking Jackson off the \$20 bill. It is clear that those who wish to see him removed are having their say. If you don't think so, do a quick internet search. If we do nothing in defense of our Masonic Brother, we only have ourselves to blame when we reach into our wallets and no longer see one of the greatest lights Tennessee Freemasonry has even known.

If you think no one actually reads correspondence sent to our elected officials, think again. A few days after emailing my concerns, I actually received a phone call from the office of Lamar Alexander. I didn't speak to the senator himself; the person was most likely an intern. But, *he called me* and quoted my email during our conversation. He said Tennessee's Washington delegation is aware of the situation and working to keep Andrew Jackson where he belongs. Don't let this be the end of it, though; the more vocal we are, the better.



**Chapter and Council are currently dark June – August.**


