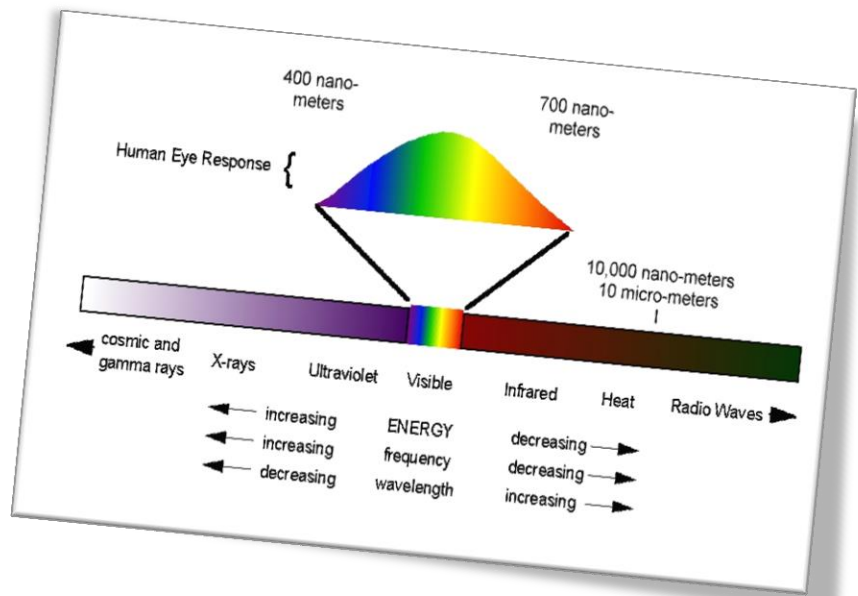
A Great Light

The most important symbol found in Freemasonry is Light. Light is a symbol of knowledge and learning. Through masonic teachings, we learn the importance of learning and science. For we all grope through the struggles of darkness from time to time. That leads me to a question, "What is light?"

Light can be defined as the natural agent that stimulates sight and makes objects visible in space. However, there is a more scientific explanation for the mystery of light. Light is simply electromagnetic radiation that exhibits wavelength. If you look at a diagram of the light spectrum, you will notice that only a small section of the spectrum contains visible light. The rest of the spectrum contains gamma rays, x-rays, ultraviolet rays, microwaves, and radio waves.

Have you ever taken a glass prism, held it up to a window, and looked at all of the colors that it displays? This phenomenon is created by the prism separating all of the different wavelengths of visible light. Pure white light contains all of the colors of the visible light spectrum. Each color, Red, Orange, Yellow,



Green, Cyan, Blue, and Violet, has its own corresponding wavelength. When those wavelengths of color combine, it results in pure white light.

I am sure that you have heard the old saying, "The grass is always greener on the other side." Is it always greener? Is the grass even green at all? Is a Florida orange really orange? Are strawberries really red? All of these questions bring us to how we perceive color. The colors of the objects around us are created by the unique chemicals that they contain. If you take an orange for example, chemicals found in the skin of the fruit absorb all of the wavelengths in the light

spectrum except for the color orange. The wavelength for orange is reflected by the skins surface. Therefore, we perceive the fruit as being orange. Technically speaking, an orange is every color except orange.

The next time you come to Lodge, take some time and look around. You just might see things a little differently. There is nothing like a Masonic journey to make one appreciate the simplicity of a little light. Remember, it is the little things in life that can make the greatest impact. It is up to each of us as men and Masons to dispel darkness, and make the world a little brighter.
